

### MARKET SUMMARY

- Ocean freight rates continue to plummet around the globe with pricing on many trade-lanes reaching all-time record lows. The importation of miscellaneous manufactured goods is down in yearon-year figures for the month of March. Shipping lines are unlikely to get any opportunities over the next few months to introduce price increases whilst demand remains low.
- The recent introduction of the Free Trade Agreement with India has led to an increased desire by importers to look to the populous nation as a potential alternative for sourcing goods. There remain some deterrents however with transit times from India quite long in comparison to those from South and East Asia.

#### VICTORIA'S BIG BUILD

#### Major works in Autumn 2023

As part of the West Gate Tunnel Project, we're widening the West Gate Freeway from 8 to 12 through lanes and building new connections to the city and CityLink to make it easier and quicker to get around. This autumn, we will be carrying out a series of complex structural works, affecting how you'll get to and from the city. From late March, there will be road, ramp and lane closures near Williamstown Road, Footscray Road (outbound) and the West Gate Bridge (outbound).

Footscray Road - full closure of outbound carriageway between Dock Link Road and Appleton Dock Road (from 11pm Thursday 30 March to late May)

Footscray Road outbound carriageway between Dock Link Road and Appleton Dock Road will be closed 24/7 from 11pm Thursday 30 March until late May.

#### Why this closure is needed

This is the next phase in a series of closures as our massive crane (also known as the launching gantry) continues building Melbourne's newest motorway above Footscray Road. Since the beginning of 2023, the crane has been working over the citybound carriageway of Footscray Road. It has now switched sides and heading back west to safely build the new road connections to Dynon Road, Footscray Road and CityLink. From January to June, the crane will be making its way directly over Footscray Road to lift and install nearly 400 concrete segments (each weighing up to 100 tonnes), to build these connections. To ensure the safety of all road users and our crews, Footscray Road will be closed in one direction at a time as the work is carried out. As the launching gantry progresses, further closures of some citybound and westbound lanes will be carried out until June 2023. Further information will be provided closer to the date to allow motorists to plan their journey.

#### **Detour**

From 30 March detour via Dynon Road for westbound travel. Citybound will remain open. Allow an extra 15 minutes travel time.

# PORT OF MELBOURNE: MARCH COMPARISON REPORT

ort of Melbourne has reported a decrease in container volumes in March 2023, with a total of 267,294 TEU - a 2.3% decrease in comparison to March 2022. Year-to-date container volumes were down 0.2%. Further statistics comparing March 2023 to March 2022 saw:

- Full overseas imports was up 2.7% with paperboard, clothing and electrical machinery higher than last year's volumes.
- Shipments of furniture, domestic appliances and miscellaneous manufactures were below last year's volumes.
- Full overseas exports dropped 1.8% with paperboard, hay and fodder and wine all less than last year's volumes.
- Empty container movements at the Port of Melbourne increased by 4.5%.
- Breakbulk was up 25.8%.
- Liquid bulk was up 22.9%.
- Dry bulk trade was up 8.7%.

Currently, Port of Melbourne advised container trade for April 2023 is tracking above the comparative month last year.



## COLLABORATIVE EFFORTS DEVELOP CARBON CALCULATOR

ario, a company specialising in freight management software, has teamed up with Swinburne University of Technology to create a carbon calculator that can help businesses make informed decisions regarding freight consignment. The online tool will enable companies to choose the most environmentally-friendly shipment methods, such as shipping via road or rail freight. The carbon calculator was developed by data scientists at Cario based on a prototype created by Swinburne undergraduate students and researchers in 2020.

Fiona Marshall, the director of Cario, stated that the transport sector is responsible for 16% of Australia's carbon emissions, making it imperative to find innovative solutions to reduce this output. She emphasised the significance of taking the industry one step closer to becoming more eco-friendly. Since the launch of the calculator, Cario's clients have become more aware of their scope 3 carbon output, and they can now see how much carbon dioxide is emitted by each vehicle type/size and the load portion.

The carbon calculator also shows users the number of trees that must be planted to offset their emissions. Marshall believes that the calculator is a perfect example of bringing the next generation of logistics and freight industry leaders together to help solve realworld problems and interact with industry partners in a dynamic way.

According to Associate Professor Hadi Ghaderi, the discipline leader for logistics and supply chain management at Swinburne, the university focuses on developing programs that prepare students for "careers of the future." The collaboration with Cario has strengthened the linkages between the university and the industry, creating industry-ready graduates by offering realworld experience.

# PORT OF MELBOURNE - HOME TO A METHANOL BUNKERING HUB?

even maritime and energy companies, including Port of Melbourne, Maersk, ANL, Svitzer, Stolthaven Terminals, HAMR Energy, and ABEL Energy, have signed a memorandum of understanding to explore the possibility of creating a green methanol bunkering hub at the Port of Melbourne. The signatories aim to investigate the feasibility of transporting green methanol from production sites in Bell Bay, Tasmania and Portland, Victoria to the port for storage and bunkering services. The MoU serves as a starting point for the parties to collaborate on establishing a green methanol bunkering hub and to identify any challenges that must be addressed.

Saul Cannon, Port of Melbourne CEO, said decarbonisation of the maritime industry is gaining pace. He said, "as Australia's largest container port with around 3000 ships visiting annually, it makes sense that we look at ways to work together with customers, service providers and producers to understand the needs of the market."

My Therese Blank, Maersk's regional head of market for Oceania, believes Australia needs to take a leadership role to enable the fuel transformation from fossil to green fuel. "Maersk has already ordered container vessels that will be operated on green methanol, which is a proven solution for reducing the shipping industry's carbon emissions and mitigating its impact on the environment," she said.

Shane Walden, ANL managing director, said alternative energies are integral to reducing carbon emissions throughout the supply chain. He said, "green methanol presents another excellent opportunity for the shipping industry to decarbonise and we are supportive of the robust exploration of a bunkering hub such as this," he said.

Svitzer global head of green ports, Ivan Spanjic, welcomed the MoU as an important step to driving greener shipping in Australia. "It is through a partnership approach that we will best meet the future decarbonisation challenges facing the wider shipping industry," he said.

Melissa Horne, Minister for ports and freight, said the Victorian Commercial Ports Strategy

is helping drive what she claims is the biggest ports reform program in decades. "This announcement complements our work to protect the future of our commercial ports, which includes the Port of Melbourne as a hub for trade and to ensure it remains one of the biggest and best ports in the country," Ms Horne said.

Lily D'Ambrosio, Minister for energy and resources, said Victoria has an ambitious decarbonisation agenda. "This announcement is another example of how we're leading the development of renewable and alternative fuels," she said.

Ben Serong, Stolthaven Terminals general manager, said this is one of many projects the company supports to enable the transition to greener energy alternatives. "The scope of activities involved under this MoU will evolve as the collaboration progresses and the parties develop a clearer understanding of how our respective expertise can be combined on this potential project," he said.

Under the MoU, ABEL Energy would develop the project in Bell Bay and HAMR Energy would be responsible for the Portland component. "HAMR Energy is developing a world-class green methanol facility in Portland, Victoria to accelerate shipping industry decarbonisation which will rely entirely on natural and renewable resources available in Australia," HAMR Energy director and company secretary David Stribley said.

ABEL Energy CEO, Michael van Baarle, also welcomed the MoU, stating, "ABEL Energy's first Australian green hydrogen and methanol project will be built at the port of Bell Bay, using Tasmania's renewable hydro and windbased power supply."

# COFFEE BEAN SHIPMENT CONCEALS 120 KILOGRAMS OF COCAINE

n Tuesday 25th April, the Australian Border Force officers seized 120 kg of cocaine at the Sydney Container Examination Facility. The ABF Officers inspected the container as part of their targeted operation, concentrating on border controlled drugs and shipping containers arriving from central and South America.

Upon inspection, the container seal was found to be damaged, prompting an x-ray to be done which revealed further anomalies. The contents of the container included three black duffel bags wrapped in plastic among hessian sacks filled with coffee beans. The duffel bags concealed the cocaine which was estimated to be worth approximately \$48 million.

Justin Bathurst, ABF Commander, said the ABF is committed to protecting Australia's borders and international ports. "Our goal is to protect our community by ensuring illegal and dangerous drugs do not make their way to our streets...In this instance, ABF has been able to prevent approximately 600,000 drug deals. ABF's technical expertise and sophisticated technology means that we will find the drugs, regardless of the method of concealment these criminals use."
